## **WORD AND OBJECT**

*By WILLARD VAN ORMAN QUINE, Edgar Pierce Professor  
of Philosophy, Harvard University.*

Language consists of dispositions, socially instilled, to respond observably to socially observable stimuli. Such is the point of view from which a noted philosopher and logician examines, in this book, the notion of meaning and the linguistic mechanisms of objective reference. In the course of his discussion, Professor Quine analyses and illuminates many important issues in linguistic philosophy and the semantics of reference: he pinpoints the difficulties involved in translation, brings to light the anomalies and conflicts implicit in our language's *referential apparatus*, and develops remedies for these along the lines of modern logic. In addition, the author provides a clarification of semantic problems connected with the imputation of existence — and marshals reasons for admitting or repudiating each of various categories of supposed objects. A particularly significant feature of the work is Professor Quine's argument that the notion of a language-transcendent "sentence meaning" must on the whole be rejected — and therefore that meaningful studies in the semantics of reference can only be directed toward substantially the same language in which they are conducted.
