

THE CLAUDE A. EGGERTSEN DISSERTATION PRIZE: This \$1000 prize will be awarded for the most outstanding dissertation in the History of Education completed in the previous year.

THE HISTORY OF EDUCATION SOCIETY AWARD: This award of \$500 will be made biennially to the best essay in the history of education published in any journal over the previous two years. The next award will be presented at the fall 2004 meeting of the History of Education Society. Any article published in 2003 or 2004 will be eligible for the award.

THE HENRY BARNARD PRIZE: This prize of \$500 is awarded biennially to the best essay in the history of education by a graduate student. The next award will be presented at the fall 2005 meeting of the History of Education Society. The winning essay will be published in the *History of Education Quarterly*.

OUTSTANDING BOOK AWARD: This award of \$500 is made annually to the author of the best book on the history of education published in the previous year. The committee will accept nominations but will also make every effort to review all relevant works, whether or not they have been nominated. The award for books bearing 2003 publication dates will be announced at the annual meeting of the Society in 2004.
