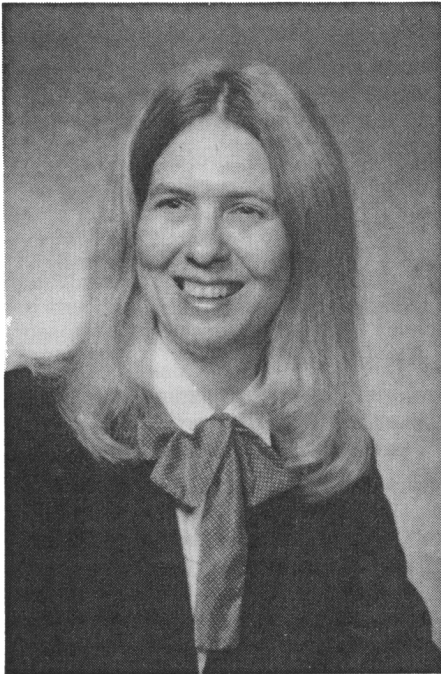

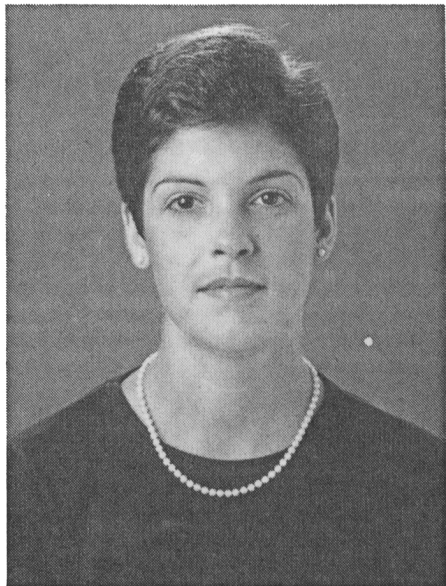
1984 Alice Paul Award
