Ankur Sharma is a core trainee in liaison psychiatry at the Royal Free Hospital, drawn to a career in psychiatry through his interest in art. Arriving in the UK from India in 2005, Sharma had no formal training as an artist and describes his paintings as intuitive. He describes *Trapped* as follows: 'A bird of colourful plumage, its home the tree, its aim the sky and freedom. The bondage is in its roots, the split in its desire for freedom. The expectation is for it to perch upon the tree and exhibit its feathers thus lending charm to the tree, which gives it shelter. It feels trapped because duty engulfs it and does not let it breathe'.
