- 3 Articles should not exceed 10,000 words and Communications 5,000 words in length. Historiographical reviews should not exceed 8,000 words. - 4 Three paper copies of all submissions (articles, communications, review articles, historiographical reviews, single reviews) should initially be submitted. Two of the copies should be anonymous.
