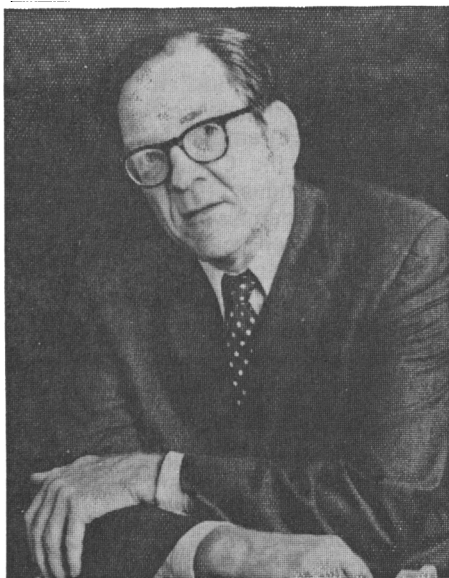
Award Recipients

Samuel H. Beer Dissertation Prize

For the first time in the history of the competition, the Samuel H. Beer Dissertation Prize was awarded to joint winners in 1983. **Gary Cox** of the University of Texas, whose dissertation, *Party and Constituency in Victorian England*, was written under the direction of Bruce Cain at California Institute of Technology, and **Peter Hall** of Harvard University, whose *The Political Dimensions of Economic Management* was directed by Hugh Hecló at Harvard, shared the prize. The principal criterion for awarding the prize is the dissertation's contribution to the understanding of British politics. The prize committee consisted of Nelson W. Polsby, chair, James Alt and Samuel Patterson.

Brown University Junior Faculty Fellowships

Van Whiting and **Darrell West**, assistant professors of political science, have won fellowships in a competition recognizing distinguished contributions to undergraduate education by junior faculty at Brown University. The awards were made from the Henry Merritt Wriston Fund, which was established "for the purpose of sustaining and improving the

intellectual vitality of undergraduate education at Brown." The fellowships take the form of a one-semester leave on special assignment with full pay.

Whiting, recognized for his unusual dedication to teaching, student advising and course development, will use his leave to study state intervention in the economy of Mexico, with particular attention to the relation of foreign firms and the state.

West was given an additional grant of \$1,500 to add a computer component to his course in Political Research Methods to show students quantitative approaches to political phenomena.

D. B. Hardeman Prize

MacArthur Award

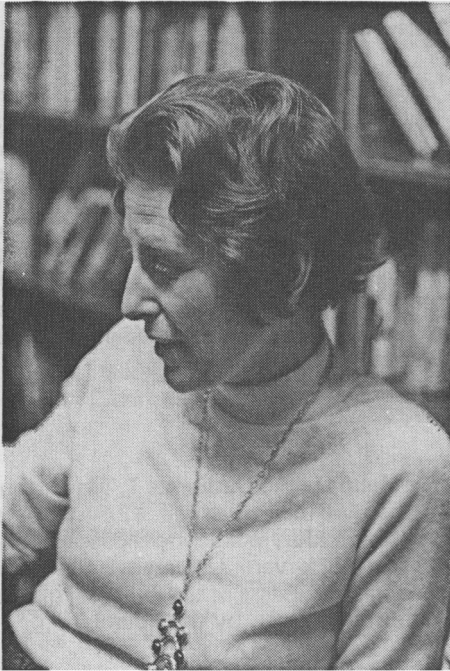

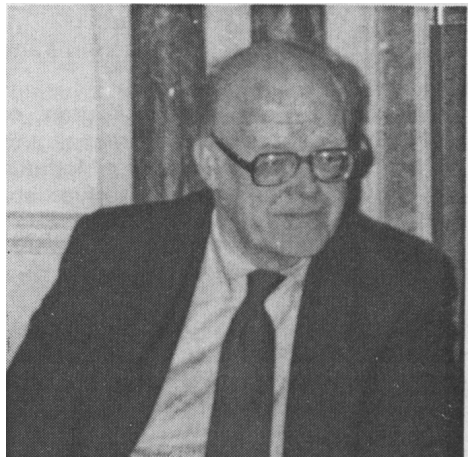
Pi Sigma Alpha Award

Austin Ranney, Resident Scholar at the American Enterprise Institute for Public Policy Research and a distinguished political scientist, has been awarded the 1984 National Capital Area Political Science Association Pi Sigma Alpha Award. The award, recognizing outstanding contributions to the link between political science and public service, was made by Charles O. Jones, professor of political science at the University of Virginia-Charlottesville and President-Elect of Pi Sigma Alpha, at a ceremony at the Spring Conference of the Association on Saturday, February 25, at Mount Vernon College in Washington, D.C.

Stein Rokkan Prize

The 1983 Stein Rokkan Prize in Comparative Social Science Research, instituted by the International Social Science Council and the Conjunto Universitario Candido Mendes, (the second in the series) has been awarded by the Executive Committee to **Jens Alber** of the Research Institute of Sociology, University of Cologne, for his book: *Vom Armenhaus zum Wohlfahrtsstaat* -Analysen zur Entwicklung der Sozialversicherung in Westeuropa (From Poorhouse to Welfare State - Analyses of the development of social insurance in Western Europe) and his article: *Einige Crundlagen und Begleiterscheinungen der Entwicklung der Sozialausgaben in Westeuropa, 1949-1977* (Some Causes and Consequences of Social Security Expenditure Development in Western Europe, 1949-1977).

The Jury, chaired by Professor Rudolf Wildenmann, upon whose recommendation the Prize was awarded, considered that "Alber's book is an excellent historically based study of the development of social security in Western Europe. Historical developments are skillfully linked with social science theories and explanations, which are then tested against empirical data and



Austin Ranney has been awarded the 1984 National Capital Area Political Science Association Pi Sigma Alpha Award.

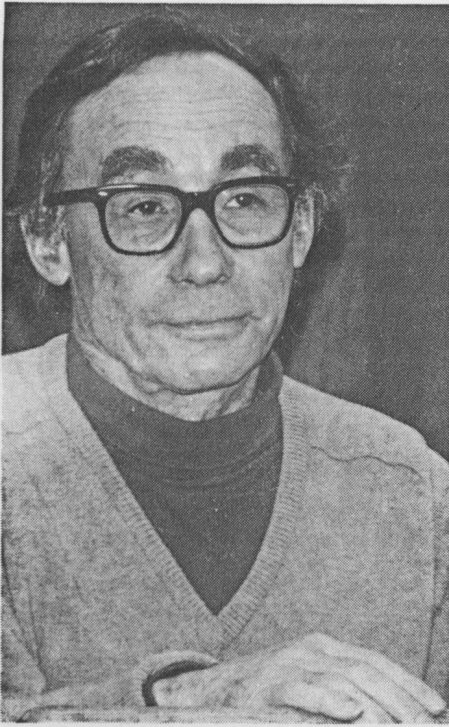
analysis - in terms of the relative importance of institutions, and of the value of socioeconomic vs. political influences."

In Memoriam

Bruce Edward Wilson

Bruce Edward Wilson, a founder of the Department of Political Science at California State Polytechnic University, Pomona, died suddenly on January 12, 1984 at the age of 57.

The academic career of Professor Wilson centered in his passionate defense of the individual's unfettered freedom to choose and the hallmark of that freedom: total deliverance from constraint and compulsion. Bruce Wilson's political philosophy was epitomized in his remark that "In societies where property rights have been suppressed other rights have almost inevitably been adversely affected as well." In demand as a public speaker on First Amendment issues, he was a true libertarian.

Wilson was equally dedicated to the furtherance of social justice, especially in areas of race relations and world peace. His concerns were evidenced in his pro-
