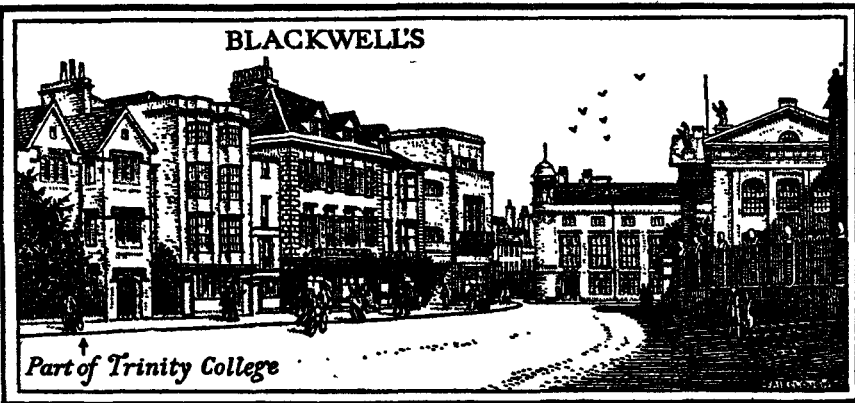

By J. W. F. HILL

F.S.A., *Mayor of Lincoln*, 1945

A detailed and full-length historical study of the city of Lincoln, based upon intimate local knowledge of the place, making constant use of first-hand sources and taking into consideration the best and most recent secondary authorities. The plan of the book is broadly chronological, with certain leading topics taken by themselves in separate chapters. Great care has been used in the preparation of maps of various kinds, showing the development of the town, place-name distribution, the town-fields, etc. There are also a number of ancient drawings, some photographs, and some paintings by De Wint.
