
Chautauqua Type Short Course Program

There are positions for 200 political science faculty in the two political science short courses included in the NSF 1976-1977 Chautauqua Type Short Course Program, conducted by the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

The primary objective of the program is to make available to college teachers, as quickly as possible, new knowledge about topics of current interest in such a way that the course materials will be directly useful in their teaching and research. Two political science courses have been offered annually since 1973-1974. The course materials and instructors have been evaluated as very effective by the participants. Conversely, the past short course directors—Jack Dennis, University of Wisconsin; Elinor Ostrom, Indiana University; and Robert Putnam, University of Michigan—have expressed a high regard for this professional development program.

The short courses are taught on regional circuits located at universities and colleges. Each course meets twice in two-day sessions, once in late fall and again in early spring. During the interim period participants work on projects related to the courses. The National Science Foundation provides participants with support for room rent, on a double occupancy basis, for the course periods. Participants or their institutions bear travel and meal expenses.
