## INTERNATIONAL CONGRESS OF PHILOSOPHY

Representatives of fifteen nations met from November 15th to 20th in the Senate Hall, Rome, for the first international Congress of Philosophy to be held after the war.

A lively debate took place between the exponents of the two main trends in existentialist philosophy, and between them and the critics of existentialism. Speakers on this subject included Jaspers, G. Marcel, J. Wahl, V. Jankélévitch, R. Le Senne, M. Blondel, J. Benda, and N. Abbagnano.

Discussions of Marxism and kindred doctrines were held mainly by Italian philosophers—A. Banfi, G. Della Volpe, G. Ferretti, U. Spirito and others—and reflected the revived struggle in the field of political ideals and practice. The issue Communism-Christianity presented itself as not liable of conciliation or compromise.

A third subject proposed for discussion was "epistemology and analysis of language."
