Half or more of the Yoruba in southwestern Nigeria identify themselves as Muslim. Although Islam ideally does not foster a clergy, in West Africa and among the Yoruba in particular, historical and cultural forces have contributed to the creation of a clerical class. After a survey of the background of the development of such a clergy, this study focuses on the variety of expressions of clerical piety that coexist in contemporary Yorubaland.
