ANNOUNCEMENT

The 1975 Annual Convention of the Economic History Association in Chicago will feature an innovative change in program format. A series of informal mini-sessions or workshops on various topics is being scheduled. The purpose of these mini-sessions is to bring together scholars of like interests to facilitate the flow of information about research in progress, research problems, etc. Scholars, for example, interested in Canadian, Colonial, or contemporary economic history, property rights, imperialism, slavery, or any other topic in which sufficient interest is expressed can meet together to renew acquaintances and exchange information. Each session will be organized by a chairman who will also serve as rapporteur to the Association as a whole. Formal presentations within these minisessions are not anticipated, nor encouraged. Rather, informal discussions and the exchange of working papers are envisioned.

In order to allow time for the mini-sessions the Annual Convention will begin one half-day earlier than previously scheduled. Scholars interested in organizing and chairing a mini-session should contact Professor Robert Paul Thomas, Department of Economics, University of Washington, Seattle, Washington 98195. The organizing committee hopes

that the diversities of methodology and interests that characterize our profession will be represented in these mini-sessions.
