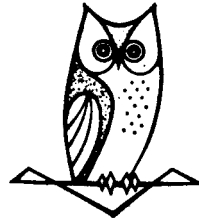

SARTRE

A Philosophic Study, by ANTHONY MANSER. The author discusses Sartre's novels and plays and his theory of literature (which are here interpreted in a radically different way from that of earlier commentators); his political attitudes, as well as his complex relations with the Communist Party of France; and the hard core of philosophic argument which the author finds in all Sartre's works. He gives a critical exposition of Sartre's thought, avoiding terms that bring with them pre-conceived attitudes, and translates Sartre's terminology into an idiom closer to contemporary British philosophical thinking. THREE WORLDS OF DEVELOPMENT

The Theory and Practice of International Stratification, by IRVING LOUIS HOROWITZ. This major study of development in the modern world considers the subject in all its aspects—social, political, economic, military and psychological. The three worlds whose interactions Professor Horowitz examines are, first, that of the United States and its Western allies; second, the Soviet Union and its Eastern bloc allies; and the Third World of the Asian, Africa, and Latin American nations. This book is unique in that it focuses on “over-developed” societies no less than on “under-developed” ones, on problems of stagnation no less than problems of growth, and on national forms of colonialism no less than on classical international styles of colonialism. A special feature is the analysis of development in the United States in the nineteenth century and in the Soviet Union during the early part of the twentieth century. (\$9.35)

THE NEW ELITES OF TROPICAL AFRICA

Edited with an Introduction by P. C. LLOYD. This book brings together the papers presented and the topics discussed at the Sixth International African Seminar held at the University of Ibadan, in 1964. The eighteen papers, in English or French with a summary in the other language, deal with the emergence and development of elites in West, East, and Southern Africa, among a wide range of social categories. A comprehensive Introduction sums up the nature of contemporary elites in Africa—their development and educational progress and their part in traditional and modern associations. (\$7.50)
