Blue Nile. 810 N. Highland. This is the place in Atlanta to go for Ethiopian food. 872-6483. \$

Camille's. 1186 N. Highland Ave. Friendly neighborhood restaurant serving pasta, pizza and Italian seafood dishes. 872-7203. \$

Manuel's Tavern. 602 N. Highland. Owned by the long-time head of the Dekalb County Commission, Manuel Maloof, this is a legendary hangout for local politicians and journalists. The closest thing you will find to a neighborhood bar in Atlanta. Standard pub fare of chili dogs and hamburgers and cold beer. Located within two blocks of the Carter Presidential Center, this is the place to eat when you visit the Center. Food at the Center is good but expensive. 269-9619. No reservations. \$

Murphy's. 1019 Los Angeles. Set in one of the gentrified areas of Atlanta this neighborhood cafe has a varied and interesting menu and an inviting atmosphere. With its own bakery the breads are excellent as are the desserts. 872-0918. No reservations. \$

Partners. 1399 N. Highland Ave. This is fine dining but can be a bit noisy. Pasta and light entrees are the featured dishes with creative use of seasonings. 875-0202. No reservations. \$\$

Tito's. 822 N. Highland Ave. Good Italian food, especially veal dishes. Can get pretty loud with weekend crowds. 874-8364. \$

Taco Mac. 1006 N. Highland Ave., NE. If you want to accompany your tour of this interesting neighborhood with a fun meal, this is the place. Fairly good chicken wings and a very wide selection of beer. 873-6592. No reservations. \$

Elsewhere

Ben Chau. 1821 Piedmont Rd., NE. An excellent Vietnamese restaurant. They presently do not have a liquor license but you can "brown bag" it. \$

Chef's Cafe. 2115 Piedmont Rd., NE. Don't be put off by the location in a La Quinta Motel, this is a good restaurant. American style food, good quality and service. 872-2284. \$

Gene and Gabe's. 1578 Piedmont Ave., NE. Located near Ansley Mall, reputedly President Carter's favorite restaurant. A well-established eatery with a cozy setting, good service and good food. 874-6145. \$\$

Harold's Barbeque. 171 McDonough Blvd., S. This is your chance to "flop a lip" over first-class southern barbeque. Located on the road to the Atlanta Federal Penitentiary, Harold's serves a varied clientele. 627-9268. No reservations or credit cards. \$

Marra's Seafood Grill. 1782 Cheshire Bridge Rd. Atlanta's first seafood grill. Wide selection of seafood, consistent quality and service. 874-7347. \$\$

King and I. 4058 Peachtree Rd. Located in the Windsor Station Center. Good Thai food in pleasant surroundings. Be sure to ask about specials for the day. 262-7985. North line, Brookwood Station. No reservations or credit cards. \$

Little Bucharest. 3200 Northlake Parkway. Located near the Northlake Mall, features Romanian cooking in a European atmosphere. Portions are more than ample. 934-9811. \$\$

The Thai Restaurant. 6065 Norcross Rd. This is a long way from the hotel but, if you want to experience excellent Thai cuisine, the trip is worth it. 938-3883. \$

A Final Note

If you want the expensive view of Atlanta without the price of a meal, then make a stop at the cocktail lounge which shares space and an elevator with Nikolai's Roof on top of the Hilton Hotel. Alternatively, there is a rotating bar on top of the Hyatt Hotel which also provides a panoramic view of the city.

Under APSA's constitution the preceding nominations are subject to the vote of those members of the Association attending the Annual Business Meeting. If there is a contest for any elected office, an election will be conducted by mail ballot. Ballots will be distributed within 30 days of the Annual Business Meeting by the executive director. They must be returned within 30 days following distribution.

The 1989 Annual Business Meeting rules are printed in the Gazette section of this issue of *PS*. The rules require that any nominations in addition to those made by the Nominating Committee must be received in writing at the Association's Washington office prior to Monday, August 28, 1989, or thereafter at the Association's annual meeting office in the hotel headquarters. All such nominations and certifications must be received at least 24 hours before the session of the Annual Business Meeting in order to include those names on the original nominating document. Specific procedures for offering nominations are included in the Annual Business Meeting rules.

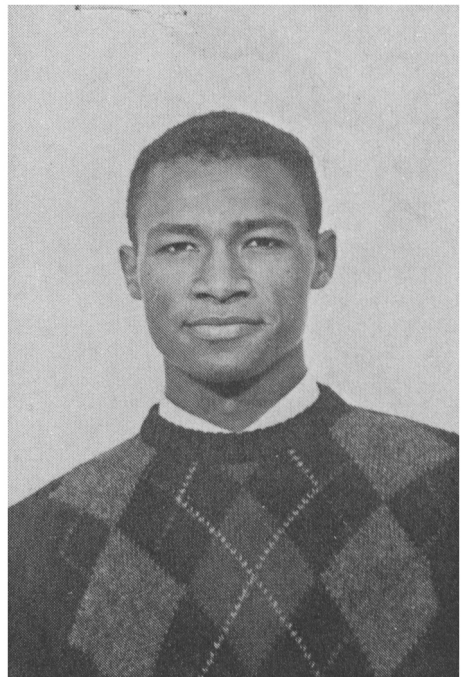
