
Harry S. Truman Library Institute Senior Research Fellowship

The Harry S. Truman Library Institute for National and International Affairs announces the availability under its Grants-in-Aid Program of a Senior Research Fellowship carrying a stipend in the amount of \$20,000. The fellowship is awarded biennially in odd-numbered years to enable an outstanding scholar to work on a book-length publication dealing principally with some aspect of American life between April 12, 1945 and January 20, 1953 or with the career of Harry S. Truman. While no restrictions are imposed on awarding the fellowship by reasons of age or nationality, to receive serious consideration for this award applicants must have a record of distinguished scholarship and publications.

To receive consideration for the 1981 Fellowship, applications must be submitted to the Secretary of the Institute by April 1, 1981.

HUD Office of Policy Development and Research Dissertation Grants

The Department of Housing and Urban Development Office of Policy Development and Research has announced a dissertation grant program in conjunction with the new Housing Research Data Center.

It is expected that up to 10 grants will be awarded on a competitive basis to doctoral candidates. The amount of each grant is \$7,000 plus an amount up to \$3,000 for the use of computer time at the data center. Support will continue for one year. Training at the data center will be available and travel to periodic conferences will also be provided.

The deadline for receipt of all applications is April 15, 1981. Awards will be announced on June 1, 1981.
