Continuous recording of all admissions to the Bethlem Hospital in London began 325 years ago in May 1683, but the first stand-alone list was compiled in 1598. Initially, only the patient's name and admission and discharge dates were recorded, but details of diagnosis and condition (cured, improved, incurable) on discharge followed later. These records were maintained without a break until the 20th century and are available to view online at <http://www.bethlemheritage.org.uk/archive/web/ARA.htm>.
