

Peter Townsend Policy Press Prize

The prize is awarded for outstanding work with policy relevance on a topic to which Townsend made a major contribution - poverty and inequality, ageing and the lives of older people, disability and inequalities in health.

Professor Peter Townsend was one of the most distinguished global figures in contemporary social policy and sociology. As an international researcher and public intellectual, he made an immeasurable contribution to analysis and policy-making in the areas of poverty and inequality, health inequalities, disability and older people. He was a Fellow of the British Academy. This prize was established to honour his memory following his death in 2009.

The Policy Press is a non-profit-making publisher based at the University of Bristol. It is one of the leading publishers in the area of social policy. It has published The Peter Townsend Reader and a collection of essays in honour of Professor Townsend.

In 2010 The Policy Press agreed to supply funding for six years, in the first instance, to the British Academy to create the biennial Peter Townsend Policy Press Prize. The winner of the prize receives £2,000.

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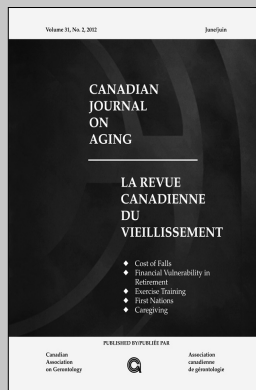
