JOB TITLE: Editor– Irish Journal of Psychological Medicine

RESPONSIBLE TO: President and Council of the College of Psychiatrists of Ireland

The Irish Journal of Psychological Medicine is the official research journal of the College of Psychiatrists of Ireland.

The College is seeking expressions of interest for the post of Editor of the Irish Journal of Psychological Medicine.

Applicants must be Consultant Psychiatrists, must be a Member of the College, on the Specialist Division of the Medical Register and be registered for PCS.

- This appointment is a **senior honorary position** in the College.
- The Editor is answerable to the President and Council in all matters.
- The Governance of this position is to the President and Council.
- The position will be supported by the Communications Assistant and Chief Executive's office of the College.
- The position is for an initial term of 4 years with eligibility for a second 4 year term subject to approval of Council.

Job Specification:

The Editor has overall responsibility for the quality and content of all material published in the Journal and for its editorial management.

This is a senior appointment for the College. The Editor will be key in delivering the objectives for the Journal. He/she will work closely with the Editorial Board and Council.

Key Responsibilities:

Peer Review and Operational Responsibilities

- a) The Editor shall have overall responsibility for the quality and content of all material published in the Journal and for its editorial management.
- b) Responsibilities of the Editor shall include but not necessarily be limited to:
 - i) soliciting contributions to the Journal;
 - ii) ensuring that all articles submitted to the Journal are appropriately peer reviewed in a timely manner, with initial peer review of each article submitted being completed within 60 days of its submission;
 - iii) accepting or rejecting contributions;
 - iv) submitting to the Publisher in electronic format a sufficient number of peer reviewed and accepted articles for each issue, prepared in accordance with the Journal's Instructions for Contributors, by the due dates specified in the production schedule provided by the Publisher, taking due account of the requirements imposed by the frequency and extent of the Journal;
 - v) checking that all contributions to the Journal submitted to the Publisher are complete e.g. that all illustrations provided are of print quality; each contribution is accompanied by the copyright assignment form; any necessary permissions for third-party copyright material that is included in the contribution, and that contributions meet the ethical standards required for publication;
 - vi) reading first page proofs, checking authors' corrections and returning corrected proofs to the Publisher in a timely manner;
 - vii) determining the order of contents for each issue of the Journal;
 - viii) soliciting review content for the Journal.

c) The Editor shall use the online peer review management system provided by the Publisher for all regular submissions, which will maintain accurate electronic data on the number of articles submitted to the Journal and the number of acceptances and rejections and provide an electronic back-up of this data.

Ethical Standards

d) The Editor shall acquaint and keep themselves acquainted with the Publisher's guidelines, Cambridge Journals Ethical Standards and Procedures, available on the 'About Us' section of Cambridge Journals Online, and shall act in accordance with the said guidelines (which may be revised from time to time) whenever practicable.

Journal Development

e) The College of Psychiatrists of Ireland, in consultation with the Editor, and the Editorial Board, shall be responsible for the editorial policy and development of the Journal. The Editor must be able to assist actively in setting the annual development targets for the Journal, and the achievement of the targeted expansion of the Journal output.

f) The Editor shall be required to provide an annual report to the College of Psychiatrists of Ireland outlining activities undertaken in the preceding 12 months.

Advertising

g) The Editor shall respond in a timely manner when consulted by the Publisher for input on advertisements to be published in the Journal or on the website.

Marketing and Promotion

h) The Editor shall respond in a timely manner when consulted by the Publisher for input on marketing materials and email campaigns.

i) The Editor and Editorial Board shall act as ambassadors in the promotion of the Journal and all its related activities (e.g. at conferences, meetings, in sourcing supplement and reprint sponsorship etc).

Regular Meetings

j) The Editor shall oversee the arrangement of regular teleconferences with the Publisher, and the arrangement of an annual Editorial Board meeting.

Editorial Panel Review

k) The Editor shall conduct an annual review of the Editorial Board to assess their recent contributions to the Journal. The Editor shall add and/or remove members as necessary, dependent on their recent contributions to the Journal, and the evolving Aims and Scope of the Journal.

Exclusive Editorship

l) During the term of this Agreement and any renewals thereof, the Editor shall not serve as Editor or Deputy Editor of any other journal that could reasonably be considered to compete with the Journal.

Conflicts of Interest

n) The Editor shall promptly declare to the Proprietor and the Publisher any Conflict of Interest that exists, arises or may arise in connection with the Journal or any contribution in the Journal or contributor to the Journal. Develop appropriate education and training methodologies in line with best practice.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR CONTRIBUTORS

SUBMISSION OF MANUSCRIPTS

All manuscripts should be submitted online via our new manuscript submission and tracking site, <http://mc.manuscriptcentral.com/ipm>. Full instructions for electronic submission are available directly from this site. If you wish to submit a book review please email your paper directly to the Editorial Office <nmongey@irishpsychiatry.ie>. To facilitate rapid reviewing, communications for peer review will be electronic and authors will need to supply a current e-mail address when registering to use the system.

All submitted material will become the property of the Journal until, and if, publication is refused. Material so referred should not be sent elsewhere for publication.

The Journal will accept for consideration original papers, brief research reports, audits, clinical case reports, review articles, historical papers, perspective articles, editorials, and letters to the editor and book reviews. Original data papers receive top priority for speedy publication.

Manuscripts should be prepared in accordance with the "Uniform Requirements for Manuscripts (URM) Submitted to Biomedical Journals" of the International Committee of Medical Journal Editors (2010).

Declaration of Interest: A statement must be provided in the acknowledgements listing all financial support received for the work and, for all authors, any financial involvement (including employment, fees, share ownership) or affiliation with any organization whose financial interests may be affected by material in the manuscript, or which might potentially bias it. This applies to all papers including editorials and letters to the editor.

Contributors should also note the following:

1. S.I. units should be used throughout in text, figures and tables.
2. Authors should spell out in full any abbreviations used in their manuscripts.
3. Foreign quotations and phrases should be followed by a translation.
4. If necessary, guidelines for statistical presentation may be found in: **Altman DG, Gore SM, Gardner MJ & Pocock SJ** (1983). Statistical guidelines for contributors to medical journals. *British Medical Journal* **286**, 1489–1493.

REFERENCES (1) The Harvard (author-date) system should be used in the text and a complete list of References cited given at the end of the article. In a text citation of a work by more than two authors cite the first author's name followed by et al. (but the names of all of the authors should be given in the References section). Where several references are cited together they should be listed in rising date order. (2) The References section should be supplied in alphabetical order (authors' names in **bold**, journal titles in full), following the text. Some examples follow:

Brown GW (1974). Meaning, measurement and stress of life events. In *Stressful Life Events: Their Nature and Effects* (ed. B. S. Dohrenwend and B. P. Dohrenwend), pp. 217-244. John Wiley: New York.
