Priority is given to original research and systematic reviews about mental health service research, aimed to improve the quality of everyday practice. EPS is published quarterly (in March, June, September and December).

Submission of a paper will be held to imply that it contains original work that has not been previously published and that it is not being submitted for publication elsewhere.
