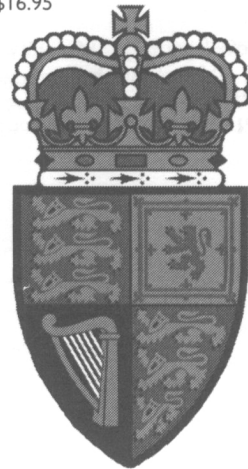
KINGS AND QUEENS OF EUROPE

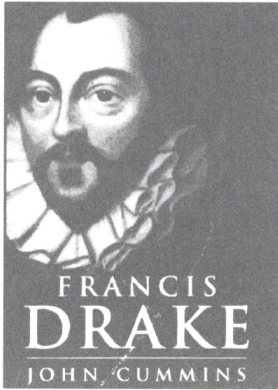

Francis Drake

From the time he was driven to sea while still a boy by his family's fierce Protestantism and poverty, until his death at sea in 1596, Francis Drake led a life of drama in which opportunism, courage, greed, religion and national policy all played their part. His naval battles and audacious piratical raids on Spain's empire are described using eye-witness accounts, and his stormy personal relationships reveal a man whose distrust of colleagues contrasted with a generosity of spirit which was a source of wonder to his enemies. John Cummins ends by looking at Drake's posthumous legend and its inspirational role throughout later centuries.

John Cummins recently retired as Head of the Department of Spanish at the University of Aberdeen. He has written, most recently, *The Journal of Christopher Columbus* (1992) and *The Hound and the Hawk* (1988).
