Annual Report for 1975

President Emeritus Honoured

Past and present Council members attended a dinner at the London Zoo in March, held in honour of the President Emeritus, Lord Willingdon. During the evening, the President, Prof. Lord Zuckerman, presented Lord Willingdon with a painting of jackass penguins by the Chairman, Sir Peter Scott. The presentation subscribed to by Society members through a special appeal, was in appreciation of Lord Willingdon's great service to the Society during his 23 years as President; the subject was chosen because of his interest in the plight of the jackass penguins along the South African coast as a result of oil pollution.

Vice Presidents

At the Annual General Meeting Lt-Col C. L. Boyle, a Council member and former Hon. Secretary and Editor of *Oryx*, 1950 to 1963, was elected Vice-President. The year saw the sad loss to the Society of five Vice-Presidents: Syed W. Ameer Ali, CIE, ICS (Retd), Prof. J. G. Baer, Lord Hurcomb, GCB, KBE, Sir Julian Huxley, FRS, and Captain C. R. S. Pitman, CBE, DSO, MC.

Membership and Subscriptions

A proposal to raise the minimum annual subscription to £5 from January 1st 1976 was passed at the Annual General Meeting. The total number of members was maintained with a modest increase of 11, to stand at 3430 at the end of the year. Eight new life, 34 Benefactor and 276 ordinary members were recruited and contact renewed with one life member removed from the list last year. 33 deaths were recorded and 275 members resigned or failed to pay their subscriptions.

Meetings

The Hon. Secretary and Editor attended the 12th General Congress of the IUCN at Kinshasa, Zaire in September, and also an SSC meeting in Switzerland in March. In June the Hon. Secretary attended an SSC Alert Group meeting in London, and represented the Society at the 27th International Whaling Commission in London. Our new Assistant Secretary, John A. Burton, also attended the IUCN meeting in Kinshasa.

Wildlife Tours

In February a party of members visited India and Sri Lanka accompanied by Geepal Fernando. In August some members joined in a tour to the Galapagos and the upper Amazon.

Endangered Species Exhibition

In June, the Tryon Gallery in London, in association with FPS, staged an exhibition of paintings of endangered species, with works by 37 artists. The Society received a percentage of the sale proceeds as well as the full receipts of catalogue sales. We are most grateful to the Hon. Aylmer Tryon for arranging this exhibition and for the generous arrangements by which the Society received £2646. This has been placed in the *Oryx* 100% Fund.

Oryx 100% Fund

Gifts to the Fund in 1975 totalled £3813, of which £2102 was earmarked. In addition £2646, the proceeds from the Endangered Species Exhibition, and £724, the balance of the Endangered Species Fund, were transferred to the Fund. Especially generous individual gifts were £247 from W.D. Francis, £200 from the Ofenheim Charitable Trust, £100 each from the Munich International School and M. A. Tozer, £91 from John D. Constable, £80 from Dr M. C. Dawbarn, £61 from D. Darroch, £40 from A. M. Jackson, £38 from J. Rasmussen, £30 from K. Richards, and £25 from I. M. L. H. Forde. The earmarked donations included £700 from the St Katharine's Fund, and anonymous gifts of £1000, £250 and £150. £5546.20 was paid out to 23 projects (listed in the audited accounts of the Fund on page 407), representing aid to the conservation of endangered species in 19 countries – Colombia, Ethiopia, Galapagos, Ghana, India, Indonesia, Kenya, Malawi, Malaysia, Morocco, Mozambique, Nepal, Rwanda, Scotland, Seychelles, Sudan, Virgin Islands, Windward Islands and Zambia. Endangered species helped included Galapagos giant tortoise, Swayne's hartebeest, white-winged wood duck, Anegada rock iguana, red colobus monkey, northern swamp deer, Kloss's gibbon, St Vincent parrot, and dugong. Grants were made for the survey of national parks in Morocco, Mozambique and Nepal and towards education and scientific centres in Ghana, Malawi and Rwanda. The largest amounts overall went to help anti-poaching efforts in Kenya and Ghana.

Gifts and Legacies

Six legacies were received during the year: £5000 from the estate of the late C. A. Forrester; £3200 from the late Miss F. E. Messiter; £500 each from the late G. H. Soward and the late W. F. Bushell; £400 from the late M. C. Bell, and £20 from the late M. J. Hayne. Donations to the general fund totalled £5705, including an anonymous £2000, £1000 from the New Moorgate Trust, £500 from D. Bigg, £250 from the St Katharine's Fund, £200 from the Ofenheim Charitable Trust, £50 each from Ms P Bickersteth, the Ernest Kleinwort Charitable Trust and Dr A. Spriggs, £42 from Lt-Col A. Ramsay, £36 from John D. Constable, £30 each from the Pamela Sheridan Charitable Trust and Portslade School, £27 from Oryx Investments Ltd. and £25 from A. E. Cole.

Meetings of the Society

Our President, Lord Zuckerman, took the chair at the Annual General Meeting in July. The Solicitor General, Peter Archer, QC, MP, was the guest speaker, and *Bighorn*, a new film in the library, was shown.

In March Dr Stanley Woodell spoke on conservation in Aldabra and the Canadian Film Board's *In Search of the Bowhead Whale* was shown. A copy of this exciting film has since been purchased for the film library. At the first of two November meetings, Eric Ashby gave a commentary to his own fascinating film of wildlife in the Cranborne Chase and the BBC's *Private Life of the Fox* was also shown. Later in the same month, Dr David Harrison gave an illustrated account of the expedition he led to survey for a national park in Oman, and *The Ivory Poachers*, a film presented to the Society by the East African Wild Life Society, was shown. A gift stall and wine and cheese supper at each added to the success of the year's London meetings.

Several meetings were also held jointly with other organisations. In October members joined with those of the Surrey Bird Club for an evening of wildlife films in Guildford, arranged by Miss Mary Rae, to whom we are most grateful. In November, in conjunction with the Berkshire, Buckinghamshire and Oxfordshire Naturalists' Trust, a weekend course was held at Missenden Abbey on endangered species of Britain and the world at which the Hon. Secretary was both Course Director and a main speaker, and John A. Burton also spoke. In December the Society joined with the Rare Breeds Survival Trust and the Zoological Society of Scotland for a full-day meeting at Edinburgh Zoo. For the success of this well-attended event we are very grateful to two Council members, Roger Wheeler, Director of the Edinburgh Zoo, who organised the meeting, and Dr Michael Brambell who spoke about the general work of the Society, standing in for Lt-Col J. P. Grant of Rothiemurchus, who was prevented from attending by ill health. William Newlands gave an account of conservation in Mauritius from where he had recently returned.

Representation

At the end of 1975 the Society had official representation as follows: The Chairman and the Hon. Secretary on the Council for Nature; the Hon. Secretary on the Conservation Liaison Committee, International Whaling Commission (as an observer) and the Working Party for Endangered Species in Britain; the Hon. Secretary with Dr J. Lockie on the Mammals Committee, and with J. A. Burton on the British Section of the International Council for Bird Preservation; S. J. Johnstone on the Federation of Zoological Gardens of Great Britain and Ireland; the Editor on the Survival Service Commission of IUCN; Lt-Col C. L. Boyle on the Oil Pollution Advisory Committee; Dr M. Brambell on the Rare Breeds Survival Trust; Major W. N. Scott on the Biological Council, and Dr Robin Banerjee on the Assam Valley Wildlife Scheme.

Arabian Oryx World Herd

At the end of 1975, FPS ownership within the 56-strong World Herd comprised 5 females and 8 males at Phoenix Zoo, Arizona, and 2 females and 2 males at San Diego, a total of 17. The year saw the birth of 8 calves (5.3) at Phoenix and 4 (2.2) at San Diego of which one died; this was the only death during the year.

Film Library

238 bookings were made during the year, including two cases where films were shown almost nightly over a one-month period to audiences in Lincolnshire. Society films were seen by more than 7600 people, mainly in schools, colleges and natural history societies. Three new films were purchased, *In Search of the Bowhead Whale*, *Forest from the Dawn of Time* and *Bighorn*, and the East African Wild Life Society kindly presented us with a copy of *The Ivory Poachers*.

Christmas and Other Sales

We are most grateful to Ralph Thompson for allowing us to use two of his delightful paintings from life of the giant pandas at Regent's Park for our 1975 Christmas card and for a general greetings card. The two pictures were

later sold at the Endangered Species Exhibition. Our other card, of roeder, was drawn especially for us by Denys Ovenden, to whom we are once again grateful. Not unexpectedly, the increase in postage affected sales of Christmas cards in Britain and the total number sold, 30,580, was considerably lower than in 1974.

Zoological Society of London

The Society is most grateful for the invaluable help and facilities offered by the Zoological Society of London throughout the year.

Accounts for the year ended 31st December 1975

We have completed the audit of the books and accounts of the Society for the year ended 31st December 1975 and report thereon as follows:-

Life Membership Fund

The balance standing to the credit of the Fund is now £12,317. This is after crediting £975 in respect of Life Membership Subscriptions received during the year and transferring £150 to the General Reserve Account which represents the value of subscriptions of those life members whose membership ceased during the year.

Film Purchases—Reserve Fund

A transfer from Income and Expenditure account of £252.32 was added to the opening balance £978.67 and from this total of £1,230.99 was deducted purchases of £459.38. The balance to be carried forward is £771.61.

Endangered Species Fund

The balance of this Fund, £723.89 has been transferred to the Oryx 100% Fund.

Inflation Reserve Fund

To the opening balance of £2,000.00 has been added a further £2,000.00 from Income and Expenditure Account, making a total of £4,000.00.
