Guidelines for Preparation of Manuscripts

Early China is a specialized journal devoted to the archaeology, art, history, language, literature, philosophy, religion, science and technology of China from the Neolithic through the Han. Published annually by the Society for the Study of Early China and Cambridge University Press, it includes articles based on original research, occasional translations of seminal articles written in Chinese, reviews of scholarship including both Western-language monographs and developments in China, Taiwan and Japan, dissertation abstracts, and comprehensive bibliographies of works in Western languages. Contributors need not be members of the Society for the Study of Early China, but all submissions other than those expressly commissioned by the editorial board are subject to peer review.
