Readers of Professor John A. Hawgood's contribution on "Manifest Destiny" to British Essays in American History (London, 1957) should be interested in "The Problem of National Destiny" which forms the greater part (pp. 165-191) of The Newberry Library Bulletin, IV, 6, August, 1957. This reports a symposium on American expansion, in which Professor Hawgood took a leading part. If the altercation which ensued between Professor Hawgood and several leading American historians often reads like the Dulles-Kruschev dispute in the pages of The New Statesman, this only adds to the interest of this symposium on "Manifest Destiny".
