- **LEGISLATIVE INSTITUTION BUILDING IN BRAZIL, COSTA RICA AND LEBANON** by Abdo I. Baaklini and James J. Heaphey (03-027)
Arguing against the doctrine of political neutrality for legislative staffs, this paper studies the empirical situations in three developing countries as juxtaposed to the historical parliament in England and the contemporary U. S. Congress. The authors contend that the values of a legislature would be lost if dominated by a bureaucracy of staff experts who could stifle the political function of the legislature.
- **THE IMPACT OF REVOLUTION: A Comparative Analysis of Mexico and Bolivia** by Susan Eckstein (06-016)
An analysis of economic and political developments in two Latin American countries which have undergone "capitalist revolutions," where outcomes are shown to be shaped more by international economic and political forces and by the use of state power than by the conditions inducing "popular" forces to rebel.
- **TERRORISM IN LATIN AMERICA** by Ernst Halperin (480033)
Analyzing the strategy, tactics, social origins, and ideology of terrorism, this paper declares that it is "a vigorous reaction against economic stagnation and social putrefaction" by the most energetic members of the young, educated class—a bid for power and simultaneously a bid for employment.
- **A COMPARISON OF U.S. AND MULTILATERAL AID RECIPIENTS IN LATIN AMERICA, 1957-1971** by William Loehr, David Price, and Satish Raichur (02-040)
Contrasting the two types of aid—bilateral and multilateral—and considering the characteristics of the recipients of each, this paper isolates those political and economic factors that characterize the donor-recipient relationship in Latin America.
- **REGIONAL INTEGRATION: A Comparison of European and Central American Dynamics** by Louis A. McCall (02-041)
Are the dynamics of integration the same from region to region? This paper applies multivariate techniques to the study of regional integration—addressing the problem within the context of a causally determined axiomatic theory—derived from an empirical assessment of the European and Central American experiences.
- **CUBAN ECONOMIC POLICY AND IDEOLOGY: The Ten Million Ton Sugar Harvest** by Sergio Roca (02-044)
A detailed examination of the failure of the ten million ton harvest and the various factors which caused and defined that failure—particularly the concurrent output losses in non-sugar sectors of the economy—this paper speculates on the extent to which the ideological tenets of the Moral Economy contributed to the final outcome.

- **RHETORIC AND REALITY IN A MILITARIZED REGIME:** Brazil Since 1964 by Barry Ames (01-042)
Consequences of military takeovers are examined, spotlighting changes in the policy-making process in Brazil since the 1964 coup, and studying problems the new leaders confront in implementing their articulated goals.
- **DIFFUSE SUPPORT IN MEXICO: The Potential for Crisis** by Kenneth M. Coleman (01-057)
The future of one-party regimes, typified by the Mexican polity, is approached through a three-stage sampling procedure to assess diffuse support and the crucial problems which could lead to a crisis of regime maintenance.
- **TRANSITIONS TO STABLE AUTHORITARIAN-CORPORATE REGIMES: The Chilean Case?** by Robert P. Kaufman (01-060)
Examining political development in Chile, this paper inventories the factors that contribute to stable authoritarian-corporate rule, organizes these factors into a comparative framework that encompasses regimes in Latin America and Mediterranean Europe, and utilizes the framework to examine both Chile's future and the viability of the framework itself.
- **PATTERNS OF MODERNIZING REVOLUTIONS: Mexico and the Soviet Union** by John H. Kautsky (01-056)
Political changes in Mexico and the Soviet Union in their prerevolutionary, revolutionary, and postrevolutionary periods are compared in broad terms in this paper, with emphasis on similarities or parallels.
- **MILITARY GOVERNMENT AND CORPORATIVIST POLITICAL DEVELOPMENT: Lessons from Peru** by Keyin J. Middlebrook and David Scott Palmer (01-054)
Declaring that Peru's military regime has significantly altered the image of Latin American military, this paper contrasts Peru with traditional military dynamics in Brazil and Argentina; Peruvian institution-building is evaluated within the framework of the corporatist model.
- **ECONOMIC DEPENDENCY IN AFRICA AND LATIN AMERICA** by Barbara Stallings (01-031)
Concepts of dependency theory are examined with emphasis on international economic relations including: concentrations of imported capital, foreign personnel from advanced countries, and trade of primary products with industrialized areas.
- **LATIN AMERICA IN THE WORLD SYSTEM: The Limits of Internationalism** by James D. Theberge (480027)
Latin America's global integration--based on new and deepening relations with regions remote from the traditional North Atlantic area--is brought into sharp focus by the author, the U.S. Ambassador to Nicaragua.

MILITARY RULE IN LATIN AMERICA

Functions, Consequences and Perspectives

A provocative collection of essays which enters previously unexamined areas and frequently challenges and forces revision of the conventional wisdom about the military in Latin America. This volume suggests that (in the editor's words) "there is growing evidence that the recipient military establishments have become increasingly less willing to accept the subordinate and limited strategic posture which has accompanied external support." Thus the political function and policy objectives of Latin American regimes is likely to undergo considerable change in the coming decade. Future perspectives considered in the volume also suggest the likelihood of increased violence and aggression between Latin American nations (rather than the present and past limitations to internal warfare).

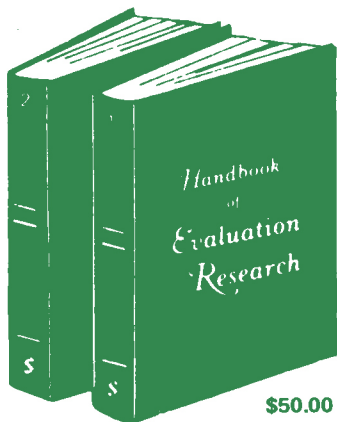
