Articles should be submitted, in triplicate, to the editorial office. They should be typed in double spacing, footnotes being placed at the end of the article; preferably conform to the styling of *The China Quarterly*; and normally not exceed 8–10,000 words in length. A style sheet is available upon request. Submission of a manuscript is taken to imply that it has not previously been published and that it is not currently being considered elsewhere.
