RICHARD L. ABEL, presently teaching at Yale Law School, will join the law school at UCLA as Professor of Law in June. He was a post-graduate student at the School of Oriental and African Studies, University of London, in 1965-67, and conducted field work on the primary courts of Kenya in 1967-68. He published a preliminary report of that research in 1969-70. In 1971-72, he practiced as an attorney with New Haven Legal Assistance Association, Inc. The present theoretical article draws upon both experiences, although it does not try to present the data from either in systematic fashion. He is currently working on the general problem of who uses courts for what purposes, in order to understand changing patterns of state prosecution and private litigation in the primary courts of Kenya.

EDWARD N. BEISER, Associate Professor of Political Science at Brown University, earned his Ph.D. at Princeton. His particular fields of interest are judicial behavior, public law, civil liberties, American politics and political theory. His published works have appeared in *Law & Society Review*, *The American Political Science Review*, *Polity* and various law reviews. He is currently engaged in research on the trial jury.
