Applications for grants are invited for financial assistance towards the undertaking, completion or publication of work that relates to any of the general scholarly purposes of the Roman Society, which are to promote the study of the history, archaeology, literature and art of Italy and the Roman Empire, from the earliest times down to about A.D. 700. Normally this assistance will be given to applicants of post-doctoral status or the equivalent. Grants will not normally be made towards expenses incurred in the preparation of a doctoral or similar thesis. Applications for grants for conferences, colloquia and symposia will be considered only in exceptional circumstances.

Applications, together with two references, should be made before 15 January and sent to the Secretary, Roman Society, 31-34 Gordon Square, London WC1H 0PP. It is the responsibility of applicants to arrange for their references to reach the Society by the same date. Further particulars may be obtained from the Secretary.

SLIDES COLLECTION

The Slides Collection contains over 6,500 coloured 35 mm slides covering a wide variety of subjects, including sites on the Greek mainland, the Greek islands, Cyprus, Rome, Italy and the Roman Empire, Etruscan tomb paintings, Greek vases, Roman frescoes and mosaics, the Roman army, and Roman Britain. WINNINGTON-INGRAM TRAINEE LIBRARIAN POST

The Joint Library of the Hellenic and Roman Societies, run in conjunction with the library of the Institute of Classical Studies, is recognised as a premier international research library in Classics. Since its inception in 1953, the use of the Library has grown massively. This has sparked the need for a mission to raise £250,000 to secure the annual Library Traineeship in perpetuity. This post helps to keep the Library open six days a week, including Saturdays and evenings, thus catering particularly for readers outside London and its university.

The Society was founded in 1879 to advance the study of Greek language, literature, history and art. It maintains conjointly with the Society for the Promotion of Roman Studies, and in association with the Institute of Classical Studies of the University of London a Library of works on classical antiquity and a collection of slides. Books and slides can be sent to Members by post; enquiries should be addressed to the Librarian at the above address.

Four lecture meetings are held in London each year and there are joint meetings with the Classical Association in various parts of the country.

The Classical Association

The Classical Association has a worldwide membership and is open to all who value the study of the languages, literature and civilisations of ancient Greece and Rome. It creates opportunities for friendly exchange and co-operation among classicists, encourages scholarship through its journals and other publications, and supports classics in schools and universities. Every year it holds an annual conference, and sponsors branches all over the country which put on programmes of lectures and other activities.

The Classical Association has about 4,000 members. The annual subscription is £3, and membership is open both to individuals and to institutions; individuals may pay a life composition of £63. Members receive *Proceedings of the Classical Association* once a year and a newsletter, *CA News*, twice a year. They may also buy Classical Association journals at greatly reduced cost. 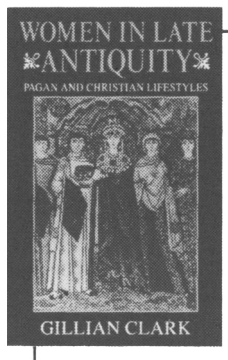

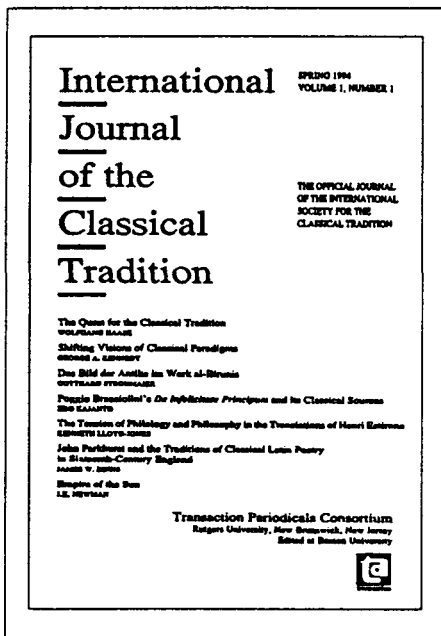

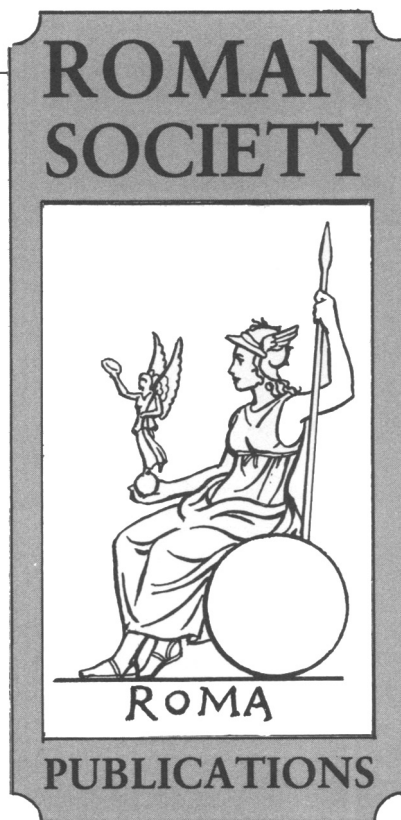

THE THIRD GÉRARD BOULVERT INTERNATIONAL PRIZE IN ROMAN LAW

The journal «Index» welcomes the unanimous vote expressed by the Panel of judges for the «Prize» awarded in 1993 and accepts the invitation formulated by Institutes and scholars from Italy and abroad. It has great pleasure in announcing, with the support of his publishing house Jovene, a competition to award «The Third Gérard Boulvert International Prize in Roman Law».

The initiative which «Index» proposes to repeat periodically, aims to encourage the development of research in the field of Roman law and to commend, in the name of Gérard Boulvert, the works of young scholars of every nationality published in the last three years.

1. The competition is hereby announced for the award of «The Third Gérard Boulvert International Prize in Roman Law» for a «first work», of a monographic nature, in the disciplines of Roman law.

2. The prize money is indivisible and amounts to 12,000,000 (twelve million) Lire.

In addition 5,000 (five thousand) French Francs and 5,000,000 (five million) Lire have been made available by the Institut de Droit Romain of Paris University and by the Centro Romanistico Internazionale «Copanello», respectively. It has been irrevocably decided by the Panel that these funds will either supplement the prize or permit the awarding of «special prizes».

3. The competition is open to scholars who have published or written in definitive form their first work in the three years 1992-93-94. The work should be of a monographic nature, on matters relating to the history of Roman law and Ancient laws.

4. Applications for entry to the competition, accompanied by a copy of the work, should reach the Prize Organizers c/o the editorial office of the journal *Index*, Via Chiaja 149/a - 80121 Naples (Fax 081.5523852), no later than 30th April, 1995. The Prize Organizers should also receive, under separate cover, four additional copies of the work by the above deadline. Works written in languages other than Italian, French, German, English, Spanish and Latin should be accompanied by a detailed summary (30-50 pages) written in one of these languages.

5. The prize will be awarded in order of merit established irrevocably after due consideration by the Panel of judges.

6. The Panel consists of the Director of *Index*, Professor Luigi Labruna, of the University of Naples Federico II, and of Professors Hans Ankum, University of Amsterdam, Luigi Capogrossi Colognesi, University of Rome «La Sapienza», Alessandro Corbino, President of the Centro Romanistico Internazionale «Copanello», Michel Humbert, University of Paris II, Rolf Knütel, University of Bonn, Henryk Kupiszewski, University of Warsaw, Pierre Lévêque, University of Besançon, Peter Stein, Queen's College Cambridge, Gunter Wesener, University of Graz.
