
Applications for grants are invited for financial assistance towards the undertaking, completion or publication of work that relates to any of the general scholarly purposes of the Roman Society, which are to promote the study of the history, archaeology, literature and art of Italy and the Roman Empire, from the earliest times down to about A.D. 700. In addition, postgraduate students may apply for small grants for visits to conferences and for other minor research expenses. Grants for the organisation of conferences, colloquia and symposia will be considered only in exceptional circumstances.

Applications, together with two references, should be made before 15 January and sent to the Secretary, Roman Society, Senate House, Malet Street, London WC1E 7HU. It is the responsibility of applicants to arrange for their references to reach the Society by the same date. Application forms may be obtained from the Secretary.

SCHOOLS COMMITTEE

The Society's Schools Committee makes grants to schools to help promote the teaching of Latin and Roman studies. Most of the grants are awarded for the purchase of textbooks and other books on Roman topics, but the Committee also makes awards to groups and schools organising lectures or study days on Roman themes, and has recently made money available for archaeology fieldwork bursaries (see opposite page). Applications from schools planning to start courses in Latin are particularly welcome.

The annual budget is c. £6,000, and the usual level of award is £50 to £500. The Committee meets three times a year. Applications should be sent to the Secretary, Roman Society, Malet Street, London WC1E 7HU to arrive by 1 February, 1 July or 1 November in any year. There is no special application form, but applicants should provide information about the level of their departmental budget, the type of courses taught, and in the case of applications for books, a list of the books wanted with their prices.



ARCHAEOLOGY FIELDWORK BURSARIES



The Schools Committee of the Roman Society, in conjunction with the Roman Research Trust, invites applications for its new archaeological fieldwork bursaries for 16 to 18 year olds. These bursaries are made available partly by funding from the Roman Society, and partly by funding from the Roman Research Trust (www.csad.ox.ac.uk/RRT). All eligible applications will be considered for support from both funds; successful candidates will be told which fund their support comes from. The bursaries are designed to cover costs of up to £150 per week to enable applicants to participate on an archaeological project. The project should have some link to Roman studies.

To apply candidates should contact first the director/principal investigator of the project they wish to join. The director should then write a short letter (no more than one side of A4) confirming his/her willingness to take the candidate on the project. This letter should also specify what and how training will be provided, noting the staff/supervisor: digger/student ratio. It should also confirm that the candidate, if accepted on the project, would be fully insured. Finally, a copy of the project risk assessment/health and safety guidelines should accompany the letter from the director.

The candidate should then send a copy of the director's letter and risk assessment, with a covering letter to Dr Helen Cockle, Society for the Promotion of Roman Studies, Senate House, University of London, Malet Street, London WC1E 7HU by **4 February 2004**. The covering letter should outline the applicant's reasons for wishing to apply, their other sources of finance, and the amount requested. It should be clear from the letter exactly what costs the award is expected to cover. Candidates are advised that in the event of strong demand for these bursaries, it *may* not be possible to award grants to cover more than one week at a time.

ARCHAEOLOGY COMMITTEE

The Archaeology Committee was formed in 1993. Its brief was to organise a regular conference to act 'as a forum where those interested in the archaeology of the Roman Empire and those more specifically concerned with Roman Britain' could come together. This initiative has led to a highly successful series of international, biennial conferences, the first five being held in the Universities of Reading, Nottingham, Durham, Glasgow and Leicester respectively. The sixth will be in the University of Birmingham in Spring 2005; further details are available from Dr Simon Esmonde Cleary, Institute of Archaeology and Antiquity, University of Birmingham, Birmingham B15 2TT; e-mail: a.s.esmonde_cleary@bham.ac.uk.

The Committee also acts as a conduit through which the Society's advisory role in archaeological matters, as one of the national period societies, can be fulfilled. It considers reports and responds as appropriate.

REPRESENTATION OF THE SOCIETY ABROAD

The Council of the Society invites applications from members to attend a conference of a sister body in another country or to undertake a lecture tour as an official representative of the Society. The Society is willing to pay up to a maximum of £500 for a single conference or lecture tour, to help cover the travel costs. The delegate will be required to submit a report to Council on the state of Roman studies in the country concerned. Preference will be given to a delegate going to a country where the subject may benefit from the Society's representation.

Applications should be sent to the Secretary, at least six months before the conference or lecture tour, for approval by Council.

HELLENIC AND ROMAN SOCIETIES' SLIDES COLLECTION

The Slides Collection contains over 6,700 coloured 35 mm slides covering a wide variety of subjects, including sites on the Greek mainland, the Greek islands, Cyprus, Rome, Italy and the Roman Empire, Etruscan tomb paintings, Greek vases, Roman frescoes and mosaics, the Roman army, and Roman Britain. Slides of artefacts form a large part of the collection and include bronzes, jewellery and vases as well as maps, plans, models and reconstructions. A computerised subject index is available. A Greek Slide Catalogue is available at £7.50, a Roman Slide Catalogue at £6.50 or both for £12 (postage £1 extra for each catalogue).

The Society for the Promotion of Hellenic Studies, generally known as the Hellenic Society, was founded in 1879 to advance the study of Greek language, literature, history, art and archaeology in the Ancient, Byzantine and Modern periods. It has done this ever since by various means, chief among them being the annual publication of the *Journal of Hellenic Studies* and, since the 1950s, its supplement, *Archaeological Reports*. All members receive both these publications annually. Occasional monographs are published, the latest being *Greek Scripts: an illustrated introduction*, edd. P. Easterling and C. Handley (2001, 76 pp., 102 illus., paperback, ISBN 0 902984 17 9), available at £15/US\$30 to Society members; *Homer, Tragedy and Beyond: Essays in honour of P.E. Easterling*, edd. F. Budelmann and P. Michelakis (2001, 276 pp., 2 illus., paperback, ISBN 0 902984 19 5) available at £25/\$50 to Society members.

The Society also helps to maintain the Joint Library on the third floor of Senate House, in conjunction with the Roman Society and the Institute of Classical Studies. Membership of the Hellenic Society allows the reader to borrow (within the UK) up to four books at a time, either in person or by post. Members may also borrow slides from the Joint Library's extensive collection.

The Society also arranges an annual lecture series in London, holds occasional receptions and other meetings, and helps to arrange other lectures in collaboration with the various local branches of the Classical Association. A programme of all these lectures and other meetings is circulated to UK members in September. The Society holds a list of lecturers on topics in Hellenic Studies, which is supplied to Classical Associations and others to help them plan their own lecture programmes.

The Society aims to help those engaged in Hellenic Studies at all levels, and to this end it makes grants to schools, colleges, universities and individual students.

Membership is open to all, and there is a reduced rate for students. 





PLAN FOR THE AWARD OF THE SIXTH BOULVERT PRIZE

The «Gérard Boulvert Society for the study of European legal civilization and for the history of its legal systems», in agreement with the journal «Index» and accepting the invitation issued by Italian and foreign Institutions and scholars, announces the «Sixth International Gérard Boulvert Prize in Roman Law». The initiative, supported by the Banco di Napoli, aims to encourage the development of research in Roman law and to recognize, in the name of Gérard Boulvert, the works of young scholars of all nationalities published in the last three years.

1. The competition is hereby announced to award the «Sixth Gérard Boulvert International Prize in Roman Law» for a «first work» of a monographic nature in the disciplines of Roman law.

2. The amount of the prize, indivisible, is of twelve thousand Euros (€ 12,000). The winner will be also awarded the gold medal of the University of Naples Federico II.

Special prizes, made available by the Board, will be given by the Constitutional Court of the Italian Republic, by the Institut de Droit Romain of Paris II, by Italian and foreign Universities, and by the Centro Romanistico Internazionale Copanello.

3. The competition is open to scholars who have published or written in a final form their first monographic work on topics concerning history of Roman Law and ancient laws during the triennium 2001-2002-2003.

4. Entries, accompanied by a copy of the work, must be addressed to the Secretariat of the Prize c/o the editorial office of the journal «Index», via Chiaja 149/a - I-80121 Napoli, and must be submitted on or before 31 December 2003. Four additional copies of the work, under separate cover, must be sent to the Secretariat on or before the above deadline. Works written in languages other than Italian, French, German, English, Spanish and Latin must be accompanied by a detailed summary (30-50 pages) written in one of these languages.

5. The Board, exercising an unquestionable and motivated judgment, will award the prize during the «Rechtshistorikertag» that will be held in Bonn in September 2004.

6. The Board consists of the Director of «Index», Professor Luigi Labruna, University of Naples Federico II, and of Professors Jean Andreau, Director of Studies at the EHESS, Paris, Hans Ankum, University of Amsterdam, Luigi Capogrossi Colognesi, University of Roma «La Sapienza», Alessandro Corbino, President of the Centro Romanistico Internazionale Copanello, Michel Humbert, University of Paris II, Rolf Knütel, University of Bonn, Juan Miquel, University of Barcellona Pompeu Fabra, Alan Rodger, Judge of the House of Lords, London, Gunter Wesener, University of Graz, and of professors *emeriti* Pierre Lévêque, University of Franche-Comté (Besançon) and Peter Stein, Queens' College, Cambridge.
