Policy Studies Organization Invites Book Chapters and Book Proposals

In addition to the publishing of the *Policy Studies Journal* and the *Policy Studies Review*, the Policy Studies Organization is pleased to announce that it now sponsors five book series. Each series is open to receiving proposals for book chapters and for edited books. The publishers of the series are JAI Press, Sage Publications, Greenwood Press, and Macmillan/St. Martin's.

JAI Press is publishing two series for the Policy Studies Organization. One series is called *Public Policy Studies: A Multi-Volume Treatise*. It consists of ten volumes covering all fields of public policy studies, including basic concepts/methods, policy formation, policy implementation, state/urban policy, cross-national policy, economic policy, social policy, natural science policy, domestic political policy, and foreign political policy. The volumes will be updated every few years. Anyone interested in contributing to any of these series should send a proposal to the Policy Studies Organization, 361 Lincoln Hall, University of Illinois, Urbana, IL 61801.

The second JAI Press series is the Research Annuals in *Public Policy Analysis and Management* and the Research Annuals in *Law and Policy Studies*. Each of those annual volumes will emphasize papers that are substantially longer than journal articles, averaging about 50 manuscript pages apiece. The policy analysis papers for the first volume will be grouped into papers dealing with policymaking structures, policy-

making personnel, policy formation, policy implementation, policy evaluation, and cross-national policy analysis. The legal policy papers for that first volume will be grouped into the judicial process, judicial personnel, economic regulation, equal treatment under law, and matters of life and death.

The third series is the PSO-Sage *Yearbooks in Politics and Public Policy*. That series is now publishing its 15th volume. The series specializes in books that cut across policy fields and that draw upon papers presented at APSA and regional political science meetings. The two most recent volumes are Larry Wade and Alex Groth, *Comparative Resource Allocation*, and Marc Holzer and Stuart Nagel, *Productivity and Public Policy*. The next two volumes are Frank Fischer and John Forrester, *Social Values and Public Policy*, and Dennis Palumbo, *The Politics of Evaluation*.

The fourth series is with Greenwood Press. About a dozen volumes are now at various stages of completion. The series specializes in volumes covering specific fields of public policy. The first volume in this new series will be Jack DeSario and Stuart Langton, *Citizen Participation and Public Policy*. The series especially draws upon expanded versions of articles from *PSJ* and *PSR*.

The fifth series is with Macmillan and St. Martin's in a joint publishing arrangement. The series specializes in policy perspectives and problems that have important cross-national implications. The first volume in the new series will be David Roessner, *Technological Innovation and Public Policy*.

Two previous series of the Policy Studies Organization have now been filled. They are the PSO Series with Lexington Books and the PSO Series with Associated Faculty Press, formerly Kennikat Press. The series with Lexington Books contains over 60 volumes. Those volumes have been favorably reviewed. Many are now available in reprinted forms at a large discount from the University Press of America. All PSO members are entitled to a one-third discount off the list price of the volumes in the Lexington series and the Sage series, and a one-fifth discount

off the list price of the volumes in the *AFP-Kennikat series*.

In addition to those series, the Policy Studies Organization is pleased to be associated with a number of publishers who have published individual PSO volumes, as contrasted to a PSO series. They include Praeger Publishers, Transaction Books, Southern Illinois University Press, Marcel Dekker, Rowman Allanheld, University of Pittsburgh Press, and Kluwer-Nijhoff.

West German Internship Competition Announced

Associates of the Conference Group on German Politics (CGGP), an independent group of scholars who devote a major portion of their professional work to the study of German affairs, announce a competition for a limited number of internship and "scholar-in-residence" awards in West German offices.

These appointments will be for three-month periods in 1986. Deadline for receipt of applications for spring/summer/fall openings in Bundestag, Bonn (two openings) or Informationszentrum Berlin (up to five openings) is March 1, 1986. Note: Spring/summer openings may not start later than June 1, and usually do not include the month of August.

Internships, generally for undergraduate or graduate students, combine study of office roles and functions with contributions to the work of the office. Scholar-in-residence programs are for Ph.D. level applicants and persons who have professional experience.

Nominations Sought for Dissertation Prize

The British Politics Group has announced its 1986 competition for the Samuel H. Beer Dissertation Prize. Doctoral dissertations completed during the calendar years of 1983, 1984, or 1985 that contribute to the understanding of British politics are eligible. The contribution can derive exclusively from British research or from a comparative study.

Only a supervising professor may nominate a dissertation, and each person is limited to a single nomination. Ohio State Wins Academic Challenge Grant

The Department of Political Science at Ohio State University has just won an Academic Challenge grant created by the state legislature and administered through the Board of Regents and the Universities. This grant will allow the department to create three new faculty positions: one at the level of professor and two at the level of assistant professor. This award comes 18 months after the department was named a Center of Excellence by the University and given resources to create two new full professorships, one of which has been accepted by Samuel C. Patterson, who will join the department in late spring, 1986, and continue editing the *American Political Science Review* from that location. □

MIT and Harvard to Host Summer Program on Nuclear Weapons and Arms Control

A two-week program on nuclear weapons and arms control for college and university educators will be conducted this summer by the Center for International Studies at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and the Center for Science and International Affairs at Harvard University. It will be held June 15-27, 1986, in Cambridge, Massachusetts. The program is open to faculty members at four-year colleges and universities in the southern, eastern, and midwestern United States who teach (or intend to teach) seminars, courses, or course units on nuclear weapons issues, and wish to update or broaden their working knowledge of the subject. (Individuals located in the Rocky Mountain states and westward should contact Larry Badash at the University of California at Santa Barbara, (805) 961-2665, or 961-2991 for messages, regarding a parallel program to be conducted there, also June 15-27. The California application deadline is February 17, 1986.)

The MIT/Harvard program will include lecture/discussions on the physics and effects of fission and fusion weapons, the planning and evolution of United States and Soviet strategic forces and doctrine, nuclear arms control theory and practice, European security issues, and ethical considerations raised by nuclear weapons. Lectures will be conducted by members of the MIT and Harvard communities, supplemented by panel discussions on contemporary issues, films, and selected guest speakers with extensive experience in national security and arms control affairs.

A maximum of 40 funded participants will be selected on a competitive basis. The program will pay travel costs between participants' residence and Cambridge, Massachusetts, provide housing for participants in university facilities, and pay the cost of meals, materials, and instruction. A very limited amount of housing is available for spouses accom-

panying participants, at a cost of about \$500 for the two-week period. There are no facilities for children.

Summer School Planned on Comparative European Politics

The 1986 Summer School on Comparative European Politics, from June 23-July 11, 1986, sponsored by the European University Institute, will focus on the sociological classics and contemporary political problems. The program will examine the political theories of the classics of sociology (Marx, Weber, Simmel, Durkheim, Pareto, Mosca, *et al.*) and discuss their relevance for the analysis of contemporary political problems. It will focus on the current reassessment of Italian scholars.

Student participants are expected to have a good background knowledge of the main works on which the discussions will be based and will have the opportunity of presenting their own research-in-progress during the course of the seminar program. Up to 30 applicants will be selected to attend the summer school, and the European University Institute will make a modest contribution towards their expenses. Peace Collections Organized in Guide

Peace collections scattered in libraries throughout the U.S. have been organized for the first time in a comprehensive guide. The manuscript repositories range from the prestigious Swarthmore Peace Collection to the regional holdings of the Wisconsin Historical Society and the Southern California Library for Social Studies. There are specialized materials like the Columbia University Oral History Collection, the pamphlet collection of the Yale Divinity Library, and the Beloit Col-

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lege Martin Luther King Collection on Nonviolence.

This 75-page brochure identifies substantial manuscript holdings in some 30 repositories, and locates over 70 individual peace collections. The Guide also contains special sections explaining standards of recordkeeping and identifying the process of archiving employed by major peace organizations.

Summer Program Offered in Quantitative Methods

The Inter-university Consortium for Political and Social Research (ICPSR) will hold its annual Summer Program in Quantitative Methods of Social Research in Ann Arbor, Michigan, from June 30 to August 22, 1986. The program is divided into two four-week sessions. The first session will be from June 30 to July 25 and the second from July 28 to August 22, 1986. Individuals can profit from attending either or both of the four-week sessions or from participating in one or more of the shorter workshops, that are offered as part of the program.

Program Design and Course Offerings

The program is partitioned into three instructional tracks.

Track I of the program curriculum consists of three courses: Basic Mathematics for Social Scientists, Introduction to Statistics and Data Analysis I, and Introduction to Computing.

These courses provide an opportunity for individuals concerned with the methods and approaches of the social sciences to develop or improve their basic methodological skills.

Track II of the summer program consists of 11 courses: Mathematics for Social Scientists, Modeling of Social Phenomena, Introduction to Statistics and Data

Analysis II, Regression Analysis, Linear Models, Scaling and Dimensional Analysis, Measurement and Design of Social Research, Innovative Exploratory Methods of Data Analysis, Sampling for Data Analysis, Mathematical Models in the Social Sciences, and Matrix Algebra, Estimation and Probability.

Prerequisites for the Track II lectures and workshops are an elementary college algebra course or the equivalent and a solid course in applied statistics.

Track III courses are advanced workshops that belong to the statistics curriculum of the summer program and will be meaningful only to participants with preparation at the level of Track II or the equivalent. Courses are: Multivariate Statistical Methods, Causal Models, Categorical Data Analysis, LISREL Models with Unmeasured Variables, Time Series Analysis, and Event History Analysis.

Two other sets of course offerings round out the summer program curriculum. One set of seminars is substantive in orientation, and focuses primarily upon application of quantitative methods. Several shorter workshops of one week will complete the 1986 program.

Applications Invited for Quebec Seminar

The 8th Annual Quebec Summer Seminar, organized by the Center for the Study of Canada at SUNY Plattsburgh, will be held in Montreal and Quebec City from May 31-June 7, 1986. Discussion Guides Prepared on Constitutional Issues

The Jefferson Foundation—a non-profit, non-advocacy organization—has developed a program called The Jefferson Meeting on the Constitution that increases citizens' understanding of the Constitution by involving them in discussions of issues related to constitutional change. Jefferson Meetings foster discussion—first in issue committees and then in a general session—of (1) Article V and constitutional amendment by convention; (2) the single six-year presidential term; (3) the item and legislative vetoes; (4) establishing terms of office for the federal judiciary and altering the manner by which federal judges are selected; (5) lengthening terms of office of representatives; and (6) direct election of the president. Jefferson Meetings provide a forum through which people can examine the constitutional system as it enters its third century and ask: "Has the nation truly achieved representative government?"

The Jefferson Foundation has prepared discussion guides on each of the constitutional issues listed above. In keeping

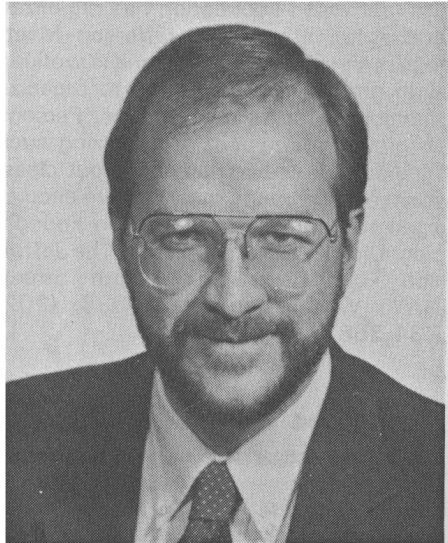
with the foundation's aim to educate rather than advocate, each guide provides a balanced "pro and con" treatment of a proposed constitutional change, and relates the proposed change to the intentions of the Founders and the challenges of contemporary government. The titles and topics of these discussion guides are:

"To Make and Alter Their Constitutions of Government," a discussion of Article V of the Constitution, which gives citizens the power to call a convention for the purpose of proposing amendments to the Constitution.

"So Great a Power to Any Single Person," an examination of the desirability of extending the president's term of office to six years while eliminating the opportunity to be re-elected.

"During Good Behavior," an exploration of points of view about setting terms of office for federal judges and/or altering the manner of their selection.

"To Control the Abuses of Government," a discussion of the pros and cons of giving the president an item veto (allowing certain parts of a bill to be vetoed while the remainder is approved) and giving Congress a legislative veto (by which Congress could disapprove of the

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way the executive branch implements legislation).

"The Root of Republican Government," a discussion of proposals for extending the terms of representatives and for limiting the number of terms they may serve.

"The Plain Simple Business of Election," an exploration of arguments for and against the popular election of the president.

These discussion guides are available for 75¢ each to persons or groups organizing a Jefferson Meeting. Individuals and libraries may obtain the discussion guides for their use for \$1 each.

The Jefferson Foundation now has available for use "The Jefferson Meeting on the Constitution: The Constitution in the Classroom, A Guide for Teachers," and "The Jefferson Meeting on the Constitution: The Constitution in the Community, A Guide for Communities." These guides, used in conjunction with foundation discussion guides on constitutional issues, will allow schools and communities across the country to organize and execute their own Jefferson Meetings of the Constitution. A packet containing either the teacher's or the community guide and the six discussion guides listed above is available from The Jefferson Foundation for \$12.

The Jefferson Foundation has organized successful state-wide Jefferson Meetings in Virginia and Illinois, and is working with groups in other states to organize additional state-wide meetings.
