THE NEWBERRY LIBRARY CENTER FOR RENAISSANCE STUDIES will offer two National Endowment for the Humanites funded seminars in 1982: (1) an archival sciences seminar, directed by Pieter Obbema (U of Leiden), which will include an introduction to codicology, a survey of methods of mansucript description and techniques of reading and transcribing unpublished sources in the vernacular of the period 1400–1700, and a bibliographic orientation for students hoping to do research in European libraries; (2) an indisciplinary seminar, directed by Robert Birely, S.J. (Loyola U of Chicago), concentrating on the relationships among politics, religion, and morality, with particular attention to Counter-Reformation visions of the state.

The third annual Summer Institute in the Archival Sciences (1982), directed by Martin Steinmann (Basle U Library), will provide training in the reading, transcribing, and editing of German vernacular manuscript books and documents of the Renaissance (1400–1700), and offer an orientation to the organization of German libraries and archives.
