THE GLADYS KRIEBLE DELMAS FOUNDATION has announced its 1985–86 awards for research in Venice, which include grants to the following RSA members for the projects noted: Victor A. Coelho (U of Wisconsin), Italian manuscript sources of seventeenth-century lute music; David Crawford (U of Michigan), Renaissance polyphony at Bergamo and its liturgical contexts; Rona Goffen (Duke U), Giovanni Bellini and the Renaissance in Venice; Anne Jacobson Schutte (Lawrence U), Venetian printers between Renaissance and Counter Reformation.

For its 1986–87 program of pre-doctoral and post-doctoral grants for research in Venice, the following areas of study will be considered: the history of Venice and the former Venetian empire in its various aspects—art, architecture, archaeology, theatre, music, literature, natural science, political science, economics, law, and studies related to the Venetian environment. Applicants should be United States citizens with some experience in advanced research. Graduate students must be at the dissertation stage. Grants will range from \$500 to \$10,000. NATIONAL HUMANITIES CENTER FELLOWSHIPS 1986–87. The National Humanities Center, North Carolina, announces the availability of 35–40 fellowships. Most are for the academic year, but a few are available for the fall or spring semester. Senior scholars and young scholars (several years past the doctorate) may apply. Scholars from any nation are eligible. In addition to fields normally associated with the humanities, applications are welcomed from representatives

of the social sciences, the arts, the professions, and public life. While in residence at the center and pursuing individual projects, scholars are invited to take part in the various activities offered: interdisciplinary seminars, lectures, conferences, etc. Stipends are based on the scholars' usual academic salaries and amounts vary according to the outside financial help given each scholar. All Fellows receive travel expenses to and from the Center for themselves and their families. Applications, postmarked by October 15, 1985, consist of a form (available from the Center), a curriculum vitae, a 1,000-word project proposal and three letters of recommendation.
