The Columbia University Seminar – History of the Working Class – is devoted to the historical study of labor and the working class in their institutional, social and ideological dimensions. The seminar concentrates on problems with comparative and interdisciplinary implications but is also concerned with narrower subjects. The framework is avowedly historical, excluding issues of a primary contemporary nature. The seminar consists of a nucleus of active members and associates drawn from the academic community, publishing, foundations, and archives and libraries of the metropolitan New York area and a wider circle of affiliates from the Northeast.
