

FUNCTIONAL AREAS FOR CERTIFICATION

Environmental Assessments includes evaluation of risks to (or past impacts upon) the occupants of ecosystems, work places, or residences exerted by physical, chemical, or biological agents to which exposure may occur (or may have occurred).

Environmental Documentation includes preparation of reports, presentation of facts, completion of other actions to establish administrative records demonstrating compliance with environmental statutes, regulations, and permits.

Environmental Operations includes management of facilities in accordance with requirements of environmental statutes, regulations, and permits.

Environmental Planning includes the arrangements for future facility construction, operation, and/or management in accordance with anticipated requirements of environmental statutes, regulations, and permits/permit renewals.

Environmental Research and Education includes teaching in academic settings and conducting and reporting on original research relating to the environment and environmental dynamics.

EVALUATION OF APPLICANT

Each applicant is evaluated by seven members of the Academy's Certification Review Board, who represent many fields of professional effort (i.e., consulting, academia, private industry, government) in various sections of the country. The Board is responsible for determining the qualifications of each applicant and grants or denies certification based upon the information provided. An interview of the applicant is required (normally by telephone).



MINIMUM REQUIREMENTS

- Bachelor's Degree
- Nine years of applicable professional environmental experience. Five of the nine years must be in responsible charge and/or responsible supervision.
- A Master's Degree may be substituted for one year of the nine years of professional experience and a Doctorate for two, however, no such substitutions will apply to the requirement for the five years in responsible charge and/or responsible supervision.

APPLICATION FEES

Applications must be accompanied by a non-refundable \$125 fee. An additional charge of \$125 is due upon certification. The fees cover all administrative costs, including the certification seal (rubber stamp) and certificate.
