The reduction in college library subscription budgets, plus the high cost of reviewing and editing each U.S. foreign policy document, has led Cambridge University Press to terminate the journal. In an age where everyone with access to the internet can access U.S. foreign policy documents and become their own editor and compiler, the economics of preparing a quarterly review of U.S. foreign policy statements and speeches have ceased to be profitable. Without some entertainment value from bloggers, the simple function of providing professional selection, editing, and organization no longer pays its own way.

Perhaps this is a statement on our age, and the very changes FPB has tried to capture and present. We believe that nowhere else can you find the key documents of U.S. foreign policy, gathered by subject and preserved in easy-to reach form. Fortunately, our on-line archive will remain available, so that tool for researching U.S. foreign policy will survive. However, the quarterly presentation of current material will end.

My thanks to all our readers and users for their support. We will complete this year with one more issue. After that, I regret to say, we shall have to leave you to your own devices.
