Museum and Heritage Summer Placements

The Society offers a number of bursaries of £300 to support students undertaking a summer placement in a museum. Placements are normally held sometime during the summer vacation; the exact length and timing is to be agreed between the successful candidates and museum. Museums and other organisations which have hosted placements recently include the British Museum, the British School at Rome, Corbridge Roman site, the Great North Museum, the Roman Baths in Bath, Corinium Museum, the Institute of Classical Studies, University of London and English Heritage. Details of the 2020 scheme will be available on the Society's website from January.

All undergraduate and MA students are eligible to apply. Candidates should apply by letter setting out their reasons for wishing to undertake an internship and outlining any previous experience of working in a museum, and providing the name and email address of a referee. Letters of application should be addressed to the Secretary of the Roman Society, and sent by email (office@romansociety.org) by 30 April 2020.

Schools Committee

The Schools Committee responds to issues concerning the teaching and examining of classics subjects in schools, teacher training and the provision of PGCEs.

Grants to schools are available to help promote the teaching of Latin and Roman Studies. Most of the grants are awarded for the purchase of textbooks and other books on Roman topics, but the Committee also makes awards to groups, museums and schools organising lectures or study days on Roman themes. Applications from schools planning to start courses in Latin are particularly welcome.

The annual budget is £18,000, and the usual level of award is £50 to £600. The Committee meets three times a year. Applications should be sent to the Secretary, Roman Society, Malet Street, London WC1E 7HU, or by email (office@romansociety.org) to arrive by 1 February, 1 July or 1 November in any year.
