Political Dissent in Democratic Athens

Intellectual Critics of Popular Rule

Josiah Ober

How and why did the Western tradition of political theorizing arise in Athens during the late fifth and fourth centuries B.C.? By interweaving intellectual history with political philosophy and literary analysis, Josiah Ober argues that the tradition originated in a high-stakes debate about democracy.

Ober offers fresh readings of the political works of Thucydides, Plato, and Aristotle, among others, by placing them in the context of a competitive community of dissident writers. Through Ober's re-creation of this intellectual milieu, early Western political thought emerges not just as a "footnote to Plato," but as a dissident commentary on the first Western democracy.

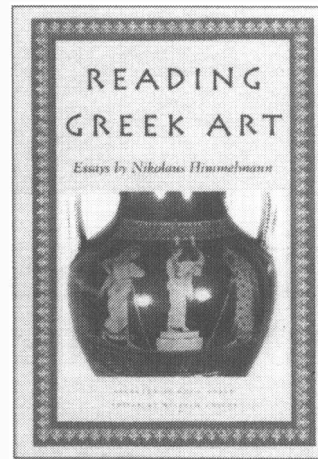
Property, Marriage Strategies, and Family Dynamics in Ancient Athens

Household Interests is one of the first books to explore in depth the nature of the Greek household (*oikos*) in classical Athens. Whereas the *oikos* traditionally has been defined as the household of the nuclear family in Greece, Cheryl Anne Cox reveals it as a much more fluid structure. She ultimately shows that the household was not limited to "family" or kinspeople.

WINNINGTON INGRAM TRAINEE LIBRARY POST
