MAJOR BARWIS-HOLLIDAY AWARD FOR FAR EASTERN STUDIES (1990)

An annual award has been instituted for the best paper submitted to the Society on an East Asian subject, based on the anthropology, art, ethnology, history, literature or religion of China, Japan, the Soviet Far East, Korea, Taiwan and Hong Kong. Award-winning entries will be published in the Society's *Journal*. Within the usual format no rigid limit is imposed on the length of the contributions submitted, but it should be understood that the most suitable length is about 6,000 words.

The manuscript should be typed in double spacing on sheets of A4-size, leaving a margin of at least 30mm on the left-hand side, and the sheets should be numbered consecutively at the top right-hand corner. Notes should be numbered consecutively throughout the article, and typed on a separate sheet or sheets at the end. Entries for the award should be submitted by 31 December 1989, and addressed to the Secretary, Royal Asiatic Society, 60 Queen's Gardens, London W2 3AF, England.
