Even before the revolutionary changes introduced by the Finance Act, 1965, the different topics of revenue law could not satisfactorily be considered in isolation. With the addition of new taxes on capital gains and corporations (both of which receive thorough consideration in this new edition) the advantage of having a work which treats revenue law as a single subject is increased. Pinson was the first, and is still the only book to do this.

The treatment of taxation of income and capital gains, has been completely re-arranged to take account of the new structure. In particular, there are new chapters on the capital gains tax and the corporation tax including the tax under Schedule F on dividends and other distributions. These changes and those made by the Finance Act, 1963 (which abolished Schedule A and introduced a new code of taxation of income from land), and the Income Tax Management Act, 1964 (which re-organised the administration of income tax) have necessitated the complete re-writing of substantial parts of the original text.

SECOND EDITION

This is a comprehensive survey of the complete field of the modern British law relating to the sale of goods.

Although the Sale of Goods Act 1893, is still the principal source of sales law, the subject does not exist in isolation. It is part of the general law of contract, and reflects modern social developments, notably in the field of consumer protection, hire-purchase and international sales. This work is therefore based on the concept that the provisions of the Act have constantly to be related to modern trends to explain its functioning in today's society. In addition the book assesses the contemporary relevance of the premises on which the Act rests, and emphasises the need for radical reform.

There are three *Parts*. The first *Part* is a narrative treatment of the history and main concepts of sales law, and of the modern tendencies and suggestions for reform. The second *Part* follows the arrangement of the Act by providing a comment upon its sections but, where apposite, the comment is appended to groups of sections dealing with the same topic. This method accords full prominence to the structure of the Act and allows, at the same time, a systematic treatment of its principal features. The third *Part* consists of Appendices setting out related Acts, Bills and international conventions, which are introduced by explanatory notes.

Here, then, is a book which presents the law of sale as an essentially modern subject. It will be invaluable to lawyers, businessmen, students, and all in any way concerned with what is, in fact, the most common business transaction.
