How do human beings arrive at their sense, or senses, of God? Can those senses of God 'make sense', or are they ultimately nonsensical? In this book Dr Bowker examines the account which the behavioural sciences give of the origins of the sense of God, and of how senses of God are formed in human consciousness. Taking seriously a challenge to integrate the separate disciplines, he suggests a way of understanding religions and concludes that the disciplines, so far from dissolving the possible reality or reference in the term 'God', seem to demand that possibility if sense is to be made of their own evidence. £5 paper covers £1.75
