Charles T. Barber, professor and chairman of political science, University of Southern Indiana, was awarded a grant by the National Council on U.S.-Arab Relations to participate in a professional study tour to the United Arab Emirates, Bahrain, and Saudi Arabia from March 4 to March 16. In June, he will travel to Canada on a faculty enrichment grant awarded by the Canadian Embassy so that he can establish a course on "The Politics of Canada."
