Three copies of each manuscript should be submitted, and each manuscript should be accompanied by a statement of the approximate number of words which it contains. A submission fee of \$15.00 is required from non-members of The Economic History Association. Prospective contributors may obtain from the Editorial Office a copy of "Suggestions to Contributors," a list of the major literary and stylistic customs of the JOURNAL.

The JOURNAL does not accept unsolicited book reviews, nor does it honor individuals' requests to review particular works. Reviews are indexed in the *Book Review Index*.
