What was the role of the U.S. Supreme Court in American life during the Vietnam war protests and the Watergate crisis? How did it rule on challenges to school busing and affirmative action? This volume offers valuable insights into these and other questions as they relate to the thirteen justices who served on the Supreme Court while Warren E. Burger was chief justice, from 1969 to 1986. Each chapter focuses on one of the thirteen, beginning with a brief introduction and biographical sketch and then analyzing the individual's contribution to major areas and issues of constitutional law such as First Amendment rights, separation of powers, equal protection, the rights of criminal defendants, the right to privacy, and due process, among others. The inclusion of tables detailing the justices' voting patterns enhances this collection, a valuable one for those interested in the workings of the nation's highest court and the records of those who have served on it.

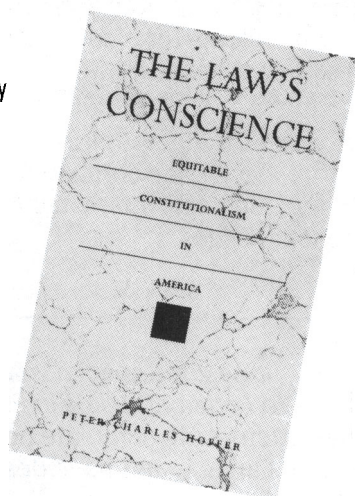

The editors welcome unsolicited manuscripts, books for review, and suggestions concerning *Law and History Review*. Manuscripts should be submitted to Bruce H. Mann, University of Pennsylvania Law School, 3400 Chestnut Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania 19104. The text should be typed, double-spaced, on 8½" x 11" paper with ample margins on all sides. Type on one side of the paper only. Footnotes should be typed double-spaced and separate from the text, and should conform to either the style found in the *Chicago Manual of Style* (13th ed.) or to *A Uniform System of Citation* (14th ed.); the *Chicago Manual* is preferred. Authors of accepted manuscripts should contact the editorial office regarding computer compatibility. Because of the commitment we ask of our outside referees, *Law and History Review* cannot consider for publication manuscripts that have been submitted to other journals. A submission to the *Review* carries with it the implicit promise that the author will not submit the manuscript elsewhere while it is under consideration by *Law and History Review*.
